In 2016 UCT was home to 29 074 students (18 421 undergraduates and 10 653 postgraduates), UCT offers a full range of undergraduate and postgraduate programmes in six faculties: Commerce, Engineering & the Built Environment, Health Sciences, Humanities, Law and Science. As Africa's top research-led university, UCT is home to a large number of world-ranked researchers. UCT is the highest-ranked African university in both the Times Higher Education and Quacquarelli Symonds world university rankings. It is home to the most top-rated researchers of all South African universities. In 2012 UCT was voted as one of the three most beautiful universities in the world by British newspaper The Telegraph.

UCT does not use a US grade point average system. Grades are awarded at the end of the semester for individual courses and are usually based on the final examination as well as continuous assessment through the semester (assignments, tutorials and tests).
